Immensely since the past 12 to 18 months as the market has been very slow. But it is important that once employees reach their respective offices, they should give time to their jobs. Interactions on phones and the Internet have increased; nowadays, more and more employees are getting inclined towards social media. Due to this, many companies and organisations are blocking such websites within office premises. Employees must work towards spending 95 per cent of their time on official work. They must look at the bigger picture and understand that their responsibility is not only limited to the family, but also the company and its stakeholders."

Employees must understand that wasting resources like electricity and paper not only adds to organisational costs, but is also hurtful to the environment. Keyuri Singh, VP- HR, Blue Star Infotech elaborates, "Most of us are conscious about environmental concerns, ecological imbalance and their side effects. At home, we try to do small things like switching-off the light when not needed, avoiding plastic and saving water, but things are handled differently at the workplace. As conscious and responsible citizens, we should all resolve to not waste resources simply because they are available freely. People often don't tend to switch-off their computers before leaving, keep their cabin lights switched on, and unnecessarily take hoards of print-outs."

Employees must appreciate the degree of damage done when they carelessly use office resources and need to start using the same in a more thoughtful fashion.
